In November 2012 at the West Branch Nature Preserve Trail in Davidson, we commemorated the fifth anniversary and 100th mile of The Thread. The 100th mile marker, a permanent stone bench, was unveiled by Richard Rogers, executive director of the Clean Water Management Trust Fund; Frank Bragg, Clean Water Management Trust Fund trustee and former Catawba Lands Conservancy board member. John Woods, mayor of the Town of Davidson; Jim Garges, Mecklenburg County park and recreation director; Mike Mabry, Carolina Thread Trail Governing Board member; and Ruth G. Shaw, Carolina Thread

More than five years ago, local leaders had a unique vision: bring together community partners, local governments and citizens to create a regional network of connected nature trails and greenways.

That progressive vision is becoming a reality and it's our Carolina Thread Trail. Response to this bold idea has been inspiring, with a high level of public and private teamwork to make our corner of the world a healthier, greener and more attractive place to live, work and explore. Many of you are taking an active out our region, volunteers are participating in workdays to build trail or help spruce up local trail segments within their communities. Thanks to a generous grants from the Women's Impact Fund and Advantage Carolina, we now have 26 Trail Master volunteers who are professionally trained to lead volunteer trail building efforts across our region.

Over the past two years, Trail Masters led more than 300 photos, directions to the trails, and volunteers and logged 1,912 work hours towards trail building and maintenance. The Thread has more than 500 volunteers that support and advocate for our regional trail efforts. CAROLINA THREAD TRAIL ADVANCES IN 2012

We're committed to working in collaboration with our community partners and local governments to make The Thread a sustainable and growing conservation gift for our region. In 2012, 12.5 miles of new trail were opened and are free to the public for hiking, biking, walking, running and exploring (some of these trails are highlighted below). Fourteen counties now have completed master plans that identify more than 1,400 miles of planned and existing trails for The Thread. As routes are refined, land is secured and trails are constructed, the pipeline for new segments will grow each year. Look for approximately 20 new miles in 2013!



KINGS MOUNTAIN GATEWAY TRAIL (Cleveland County)

Escape into the tall trees and high elevation of Kings Mountain as you jog or hike this 3-mile trail to watch the sunset or get a great workout. With five total miles in place, trail will ultimately connect downtown Kings Mountain to the Kings Mountain National Battlefield and State Park. Along this trail, which hosted more than 110,000 visitors in 2012, you'll see and read about the historical significance of the area while enjoying the surrounding natural beauty.

MOUNT HOLLY LINEAR PARK TRAIL (Gaston County)

The Mount Holly Linear Park Trail is the centerpiece of an emerging trail network in Mount Holly that will ultimately connect the community center, downtown and a riverside greenway. The wide, paved surface of this trail is complemented with ornate brick accents. The majority of the trail follows the CSX railroad right-of-way, but is separated by decorative fencing. This beautiful addition to The Thread is a great place for a bike ride or brisk walk with friends.

MOORESVILLE BIKE LANE CONNECTOR (Iredell County)

Cyclists can enjoy a bike ride along almost two miles of new designated lanes and sidewalks that connect Downtown Mooresville to Bellingham Park. The park is a popular and exceptional recreational facility that includes sports fields, tennis courts and a walking trail.



The West Branch Nature Preserve Trail is a natural surface trail located at the end of the West Branch Rocky River Greenway in Davidson. Together these trails provide two continuous miles of The Thread and a unique view of wetlands and wildlife inhabiting a conserved area protected by the Davidson Lands Conservancy. Neighboring communities can easily access the trail for nature hikes and walks. Keep an eye out for The Thread's 100th mile bench marker!





ROCK HOLE TRAIL (Stanly County)

This trail is in the heart of the historic Town of Stanfield within the quaint Pete Henkel Park. The park is a recreation destination and features various trails, picnic areas, ballparks and playgrounds. A Thread Trail implementation grant helped the town construct this one mile paved trail for walking, jogging and running.



HEALTHY FAMILIES AND KIDS

Outdoor recreation, trails and open spaces are key ingredients to healthier communities and contribute to a higher quality of life. The Thread provides opportunities for families and children to get healthy, play outdoors, connect with nature and explore our natural surroundings.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & SUSTAINABILITY

Trails attract visitors, help businesses increase customers and

development initiatives. The real estate industry cites walking and biking trails as the #1 desired amenity for prospective homeowners. According to the Outdoor Industry Association, at least 4.8% of North Carolinians and 54% of South Carolinians participate in outdoor recreation each year. In North Carolina, the association says outdoor recreation generated approximately \$1.3 billion in state and local tax revenue in 2011 and 2012.

LONG CREEK TRAIL (Mecklenburg County)

Enjoy bird watching and connecting with nature along this 2.1-mile trail in southwest Charlotte. It winds through the Long Creek Conservation Area, a 175 acre area conserved by Catawba Lands Conservancy, that's adjacent to the Catawba River. This natural surface trail connects to other great hiking and walking trails at the U.S. National Whitewater Center.

NATION FORD GREENWAY (York County)

Volunteers logged more than 100 hours to extend the Nation Ford Greenway. This trail winds through a natural area and connects with the Springfield Trail, a 2-mile segment of The Thread.
