''til death do us part." Stewardship is forever.

It takes a lot of work and sometimes multiple

years to get to the closing on a property Catawba Lands Conservancy (CLC) is vowing to protect. But that's just the beginning of a relationship that will outlive anyone involved in the transaction.

CLC's Land Stewardship Director Sharon Wilson said there are three major components to stewardship. The first is related to compliance. (This is where good communication comes in - just as it does in marriage.) The Land Trust Alliance, of which CLC is a member, provides stewardship guidelines CLC adheres to.

"When you hold a conservation easement, the goal of stewardship is to make sure that the terms of the easement are carried out," reads the Land Trust Alliance website. "Of course, it's far better

to avoid a violation than to have to resolve one, which makes maintaining positive relationships and clear communication with landowners a core stewardship activity."

MONITORING THE LAND

"Some landowners are, by necessity, absentee," Sharon said. "We're their eyes and ears on the ground." It helps that Sharon is a meticulous note keeper ... and that she's been with CLC for 14 years. To monitor the nearly 200 properties CLC oversees, Sharon photographs and documents each one and notices even subtle changes from year to year.

Compliance doesn't just involve being a witness to changes; it also involves resolving problems. Sadly, there's vandalism,

illegal hunting and illegal dumping to deal with.

It may be hard to imagine just how many issues Sharon and the stewardship team - affectionately known as "The Stew Crew" - confront. GIS Director and Biologist Sean Bloom and Stewardship Associate Sam Kirk and Sharon visit, photograph and document land CLC owns and privately owned land on which CLC monitors a conservation easement. On

larger properties, the whole team - plus staff and volunteers - may be involved.

Firewood cutting and illegal deer stands are typical trespass violations "The Stew Crew" finds. But some violations shock even a veteran like Sharon. Recently, she discovered someone had

created a driveway through a protected property to a nearby fishing hole. It's typically not the landowners in violation it's often a neighbor. So, a lot of detective work goes into identifying the culprit. And that's before the team can even think about working on a resolution.

#GivingTuesdayCLT Raises \$65,000 for Conservation

Thank you to everyone who donated during SHARE Charlotte's 2016 #GivingTuesdayCLT campaign! From Nov. 15-29, CLC raised over \$65,000 that will go towards saving land and connecting lives to nature. The 170 participating local nonprofits together raised \$7.2 million.

SHARE Charlotte created #GivingTuesdayCLT in 2014 as a local campaign that leverages the global Giving Tuesday movement. It is an unprecedented collaboration of over 170 Charlotte nonprofits and more than 80 businesses working together for the greater good. SHARE's mission is to create a more engaged community by connecting individuals with local nonprofit organizations.

Wildlife Watching at Catawba Springs Observation Deck

Two man-made ponds on CLC's Catawba Springs Preserve, a former hunt club, in Lincoln County are an important refuge for migrating waterfowl, and now those species are easier to see thanks to a new observation deck built by staff and volunteers from Wells Fargo, Husqvarna, Lowe's and Duke Energy.

Highly affected by rainfall, the waterfowl impoundment was completely dry at the beginning of November. After just a small amount of rainfall, it was full and once again a viable habitat for these migrating waterfowl. During the winter, staff conducted surveys of the impoundment and they spotted mallards, wood ducks and numerous songbirds such as the common yellowthroat warbler.

Use the Forney Creek Trail, a segment of the Carolina Thread Trail, to access the observation deck and see this unique, man-made habitat!

The second component of stewardship is maintenance. (Any marriage requires a certain amount of housekeeping.) "We own a lot of land – nearly 5,000 acres of the 15,000 acres we protect," Sharon said.

"In those cases, we act almost like a small Parks and Recreation department," she continued. Since part of CLC's mission is connecting humans to nature, eight of CLC's properties are open to the public via segments of the Carolina Thread Trail. That means CLC is responsible for maintaining 17 miles of trail and three kayak launches.

"There's always trash to be picked up and invasive species to be removed, Sharon said. "Our staff of three plus lots of support from volunteers handles all of that. And when it comes to trash pickup, we couldn't do it without a strong corps of volunteers."

Not only does "The Stew Crew" need to look out for the land CLC owns and manages, but they also need to be aware of what's happening on adjacent properties. Land changes over time, and those changes – some natural and others man-made – can have a major impact.

Man-made changes include erosion from nearby construction that impacted McAlpine Creek on a CLC preserve. Natural enemies include the emerald ash borer, an invasive beetle, which has made its way onto CLC-protected lands in Lincoln and Gaston counties and is killing all the native ash trees. "The Stew Crew" is treating some of the infected trees and removing the dead ones that pose a safety risk.

THE BEST PART OF THE JOB

The third bucket is what Sharon refers to "as the cool stuff." This is the sweeping romantic part of stewardship – connecting people to nature, restoring or improving habitats, protecting rare or endangered species and seeing the fruits of all that labor.

And for that, sometimes, the team has to look really closely.

One piece of property CLC protects is home to North America's smallest turtle. In fact, that tiny turtle is the reason the land was conserved in the first place. The bog turtle is a "federally listed species" – that's a level just below threatened or endangered. The adult bog turtle is no more than 4 or 5 inches long, and it likes hiding in mud, which makes it difficult to find and monitor them. Davidson College students and CLC staff stop by often to look for signs of their tiny wards.

When the bog these turtles call home started to get a channel in the center of it, Sharon and her team went to work to determine how to repair the channel and keep it from draining the bog. They enlisted the help of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, Davidson College and engineers and contractors. A "partners grant" from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service funded the habitat restoration.

The restoration was a two-day endeavor that involved tedious detective work – searching for turtles the size of a quarter – and then temporarily relocating them before bringing in the heavy equipment needed to fix the channel.

The work wouldn't be possible, Sharon said, without the help of dedicated partners: "who all played a huge part in improving the habitat for these bog turtles."

Stewardship: A Promise

When CLC agrees to protect land, either by owning it or by holding a conservation easement, we promise to take care of that land over the long term. It's easy to get excited about new transactions, but it's only

by keeping your promises — through consistent, capable stewardship — that we truly protect the land entrusted to us. This involves annually monitoring all of CLC's 189 protected properties and conducting baseline visits in preparation for conserving new properties.

Two Paths to Stewardship

Sharon and "The Stew Crew" monitor and protect two types of land:

- Land owned by CLC (about 5,000 acres)
- Land that's privately owned, but on which CLC holds a conservation easement (about 10,000 acres)

Either way, the team is fully committed to protecting it – today, tomorrow and in perpetuity.

Wildlife Welcome Here

With native plants and other offerings, you can make wildlife feel at home in your yard

Loss of habitat, often as a result of human action, is the greatest threat to wildlife in the United States. Creating habitat at home is a small way we can help wildlife thrive, so we spoke with Ernie McLaney, the president of CROWN (Charlotte Reconnecting Ourselves With Nature), the Charlotte Chapter of the North Carolina Wildlife Federation, and he shared five easy, low-cost actions we all can take to be more wildlife-friendly.

5 Wildlife-Friendly Actions

1. Start with water.

"Water is actually more important than providing food," says Ernie, and drought can quickly dry up water sources wildlife normally depend on. Provide birds, small animals and insects with additional water sources by placing small basins of water in your yard. Replace the water every two to three days to inhibit mosquito growth. Save water that may otherwise go down the drain – like leftover water in a tea kettle - to fill them.

2. Get outside, and bring the kids.

Take time to discover the wildlife that lives close to your home, school, work or place of worship. "Sit down and watch the wildlife," encourages Ernie. Learn about plants and wildlife to replace fear with knowledge. Inspire children to appreciate and care for nature because, as Ernie points out: "What we don't love, we don't take care of, and what we don't take care of goes away."

3. Create a small wildlife-friendly area.

Ernie recommends fall as the perfect time of year to transform a small section of lawn into a more wildlife-friendly area. Visit CROWN's website for a collection of resources on how to get started, including native plants suited to the Piedmont's climate. Some favorite natives to consider: buttonbush, winterberry, beautyberry and spicebush. And providing cover can be as simple as a hollow log turned on its side or a broken clay flower pot flipped upside down to harbor lizards or toads.

4. Speak up.

Ask for native plants when you visit garden centers and nurseries to strengthen demand for them. Talk with neighbors, homeowners associations, landscapers and developers about conserving and creating habitats for wildlife. They benefit wildlife and people, providing areas for outdoor appreciation and recreation that can make where we live, learn, work and connect with others even more enjoyable.

5. Certify your home, school, business, or place of worship as a Wildlife Habitat.®

Visit the National Wildlife Federation's website (www.nwf.org) to learn more about achieving certification by providing food, water, cover and places for wildlife to raise young. Keeping Charlotte a certified Community Wildlife Habitat™ requires the participation of community members - acting individually or collectively - to continue to grow the number of Certified Wildlife Habitats® in the city.



HOW WE PROTECT WILDLIFE

- 11,750 acres of the land CLC conserves is designated as wildlife habitat.
- Our lands are home to 4 federally protected species: Carolina heelsplitter, bog turtle, Schweintz's sunflower and dwarf-flowered heartleaf ginger.
- The 250+ miles of Carolina Thread Trail are highways for wildlife allowing animals to move and interact with each other, creating a healthy ecosystem.

SAVING LAND

LAND PROTECTION SUCCESSES IN 2016

With your support, CLC permanently protected four new properties in 2016. Totaling 158 acres of land, these conserved lands are vital to our region's wildlife habitat and water quality. Three will be open to the public for outdoor recreation via future segments of the growing Carolina Thread Trail and the Mecklenburg County Greenway system.

To date, CLC manages and monitors 189 properties comprising 15,307 acres of natural land across the Southern Piedmont of North Carolina.

PROTECTING WATER, EXPANDING THREAD TRAIL

Carpenter Conservation Easement

23 Acres / Lincoln County Conservation Values: wildlife habitat, clean water, connection to nature

With grant funding from the N.C. Clean Water Management Trust Fund, CLC saved 23 acres on NC-150 in Lincolnton, N.C. The property protects 2,647 linear feet along the South Fork Catawba River and will also have a half-mile segment of the Carolina Thread Trail that will extend the existing 2-mile South Fork Rail Trail and eventually connect to the pearly Marcia Cleninger Bail Trail

to the nearby Marcia Cloninger Rail Trail.

The Carpenter property expands CLC's Historic Rhyne
Conservation Area, which encompasses 440 acres of protected
land listed as a Significant Natural Area by the N.C.

land listed as a Significant Natural Ar Natural Heritage Program due to the presence of high quality natural communities and a number of rare plants, including the threatened dwarf-flowered heartleaf ginger.

PROTECTING THE QUEEN CITY'S TREE CANOPY

Gum Branch Conservation Easement

45 Acres / Mecklenburg County Conservation Values: clean water, wildlife habitat, connection to nature

CLC worked with the city of Charlotte to preserve 46 acres of forestland along Gum Branch Creek as part of the city's Tree Canopy Preservation Program. Located near numerous residential developments west of Brookshire Blvd., this green space will provide residents with access to the outdoors via the future Gum Branch Greenway. The county has already acquired 47 acres along the creek for developing the Greenway.

"The preserved land helps advance our goal of achieving 50 percent canopy by the year 2050, and the trees will provide many benefits for current and future generations," said Erin Oliverio, tree canopy program manager for the city of Charlotte.

LARGE SCALE CONSERVATION IN GASTON COUNTY

Big Rock Preserve

Acquisition / 60 Acres / Gaston County Conservation Values: wildlife habitat

The heirs of Stella Rhyne donated a 60-acre wooded property on Sandy Ford Road in Gaston County to CLC. The property is significant thanks to its location in the Stanley Creek Forest Conservation Area where CLC already protects 1,150 acres of land home to rare bigleaf magnolias.

SAFEGUARDING DRINKING WATER AND IMPERILED SPECIES

Little Lake James Conservation Easement

31 Acres / Union County

Conservation Values: clean water, wildlife habitat, connection to nature

Landowners Dennis and Debbie James worked with CLC to conserve their 31 acres of forested land along Waxhaw Creek in southwestern Union County. Land protection along this portion of Waxhaw Creek has emerged as a key focus area of CLC's conservation effort because of its impact on the water quality of the Catawba River, a major source of drinking water for residents south of Charlotte.

Three imperiled aquatic species also call this section of Waxhaw Creek home: Carolina heelsplitter mussel (federally endangered); Carolina darter fish (federal species of concern); and rare Eastern creekshell mussel (N.C. significantly rare). CLC used grant funding from the Duke Energy Water Resources Fund to purchase the easement.

TAKING CARE OF THE LAND

Managing Invasive Species

Thanks to active monitoring of conserved properties, the stewardship team quickly discovered that dying ash trees at two preserves in Lincoln County were caused by emerald ash borer (EAB). We worked with the N.C. Forest Service to confirm that the invasive beetle, which was first detected in N.C. in 2013, had officially made it's way to Lincoln County.

Thanks to lots of volunteer manpower from Husqvarna employees, the ash trees that posed a safety risk to trail users at Sally's Y and Catawba Springs Preserves were removed this fall.

Native to Eastern Asia, EAB hitched a ride into the U.S. in 2002 via packing materials imported from China. Adult beetles lay eggs on the bark of ash trees and when the larvae hatch, they bore into the tree and feed on tissues beneath the bark, ultimately killing the tree.





Restoring a Rare Piedmont Savanna at Buffalo Creek Preserve

CLC and the N.C. Forest Service worked together in February 2016 to conduct a prescribed burn on Buffalo Creek Preserve in Mount Pleasant, N.C. The burn occurred on a 62-acre portion of the preserve as part of a habitat restoration to re-establish a Piedmont oak savanna, an open natural area that is conducive for the growth of native warm-season grasses and wildflower.

Surveying for Endangered Plants

CLC's stewardship team assisted the N.C. Natural Heritage Program (NCNHP) with this year's survey of the endangered Hexastylis naniflora, known commonly as the dwarf-flowered heartleaf ginger. This survey was a part of the NCNHP's five-year status review of the species.

Beyond saving and stewarding land, connecting people to nature is an integral part of CLC's mission. After all, how can we expect people to care about saving land if they haven't experienced it?

With your help, we connect people to nature in two ways: through our leadership on the Carolina Thread Trail (see the Thread Trail section enclosed) and by hosting environmental education and nature programs, many of which take people onto our conserved properties!

CLC welcomed its first program coordinator in June 2016, thanks to a grant from the Women's Impact Fund! Mary Ann Harrison has been hard at work creating engaging public programs and leading member outings.

From August through December 2016, CLC connected more than 2,066 people to nature through 44 programs with 23 partners such as the N.C. Wildlife Federation, Catawba

Riverkeeper and N.C. Native Plant Society. These guided hikes, bike rides, paddles and other outdoor adventures have introduced people to seven conserved properties and 14 segments of Thread Trail.

Our conserved lands are also living laboratories and are frequently used by professors, students and other special groups for teaching and research.


